# View from the Manse:

<sup>6</sup> The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ.<sup>2</sup> (Ephesians 4: 11-13)

Yet again, autumn is on its way! But August has, and continues to be, an eventful month for me and the Blackwell household. I'm sure you will be hearing about some of it in my preaching this term.....let's just say it has been a time of great highs.....and some lows!

I am currently recovering from helping to plan and run a children's (Bible) Holiday Club in Tadley. I am now in that strange place of feeling physically exhausted from the high intensity of the week's activities but also spiritually exhilarated by the good experience of and feedback from the Club. This year we had 52 children attending, aged between 5 and 11 years old, and around 25 volunteers to help run the Club. The Club was called 'Waste Watchers' (that's waste, not waist!) and the children, over the week, became 'urban eco-warriors' seeking to recycle rubbish into beautiful things. Each morning the children's club started with a daily drama set in a park. During the course of the drama our rather graffiti-covered and litterstrewn park was transformed to its former glory and the characters in the park drama also became spiritually transformed in some way too! Both the children and the volunteers had a great time and many are already asking about next year's date and theme!

In these summer months I generally go for an early morning prayer walk around the local park......it's often when God gives me my best moments of clear thinking and inspiration (especially when writing Holiday Club Scripts!). I also often end up picking up other people's litter! Litter really, really bothers me. When I was a young girl, living in the beautiful countryside of Surrey in a little village called Horsley, I became, what you might call, a bit of an eco-warrior of my day; yes, I became a Womble! I found a large brown paper bag with handles on, glittered a large W (for 'Womble') on both sides, then wandered around the local woods and country lanes (in the days when children were a little freer to do such things!) picking up other people's litter. My poor mother was mortified when she found out what I was doing! I also (rather embarrassingly) became a defender of the wild orchids in the local woods, pouncing on those I saw crushing or picking the beautiful, and now rare, wild flowers. I think I must have been a lonely child! But the thing is, looking after all of God's wonderful and diverse creation is part of what we, as Christians, should do. Looking after God's creation also means looking after one another in Christian love.

What I value greatly in running events such as the holidav club is the opportunity to work more closely alongside my brothers and sisters in Christ from different churches in the area. The Holiday Club in Tadley had volunteers from at least seven churches. During the week we pulled alongside one another to fully express being the body of Christ in that place. We shared highs and lows over the week, and supported one another in prayer throughout our time together and beyond. It is an intensive vet inspiring experience. We all come with God-given gifts (sometimes we may not be fully aware of what they are until we serve in faith) and willing to be servants of Christ by supporting one another with those gifts. Whether it be in script writing, acting, tea making, craft, or just being a servant. God can, and does, use us all as part of the greater body. This is the fellowship that we need to model within our fellowships here at Old Meeting and London Street too. But not just for an intensive week. This needs to become, on a daily basis, just who we are as a body of Christ where God has placed us in fellowship. Serving one another wherever service is needed and praying for one another always. Being woven together by the spirit as true brothers and sisters in Christ, not just people who happen to worship in the same space once a week. This autumn I will be encouraging the next stage of the Ffald-y-Brenin prayer, learning to support one another in daily blessings and becoming a true houses of prayer for the communities in which we sit. I will be introducing two new courses. A course on 'Christianity Explored', for newer Christians and those wishing to explore more of what faith means. I will also run a new course called 'Paraclesis' for more experienced Christians wanting to learn about journeying together at a deeper level as disciples of Christ. It is important that we never stop learning as Christians. It is a lifelong academy of learning, so we must never stop growing and allow ourselves to become stale or complacent. So come, journey with me and see what new things God may want to teach us...... 'until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ.

# Prayer Focus

1. Cor. Ch12 v27 "Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it"

After the comparative Iull in activities at London Street during August, September sees a re-awakening. For young people the prospect of a new school/college year beginning and so many moving up to new educational experiences. These can be anxious and sometimes worrying times. For us we see the Community and Youth Café opening again to provide physical and spiritual service to the local community. # ELECTION OF ELDERS -

We shall shortly be considering the nomination and election of members to be called to serve as elders. Being an elder is a ministry to which a church member is called by God. This call can come through you as a church member when considering another for nomination and election because of what you discern about that person.

# Procedure for nomination and election as provided for by the constitution of London Street

Church meeting shall determine the maximum number of elders whose election is sought. A list of those eligible to serve as elders shall be handed to those on the current church roll. Each member will be entitled to nominate up to two more church members than the maximum to be elected. All those nominated by at least 4% of church members shall be considered validly nominated. They will be visited to ascertain whether they are willing to accept nomination.

All of those who have accepted nomination shall be listed on a ballot paper, which will be made available to all on the current church roll, for election to serve as an elder for a term of 3 years. The ballot shall normally take place at the November church meeting.

# What does it mean to be an elder at London Street and within the United Reformed Church?

Being an elder means that a church member has been called to be part of a 'team', since an elder is someone who joins with others to form the Elders' meeting of London Street. It is important though to remember that in accepting a call to serve as an elder, that person is not just an elder of London Street but an elder of the United Reformed Church. A person can only be nominated for eldership if they are on the church roll of members for a minimum of 12 months. As a church member, they will have an understanding of the constitutions of the United Reformed Church and that of London Street.

#### What does an elder do?

The functions of eldership in the United Reformed Church have been laid down in the Basis of Union. The list appears daunting. They include:

ensuring that public worship is regularly offered and the sacraments are duly administered, to ensuring pastoral care for the congregation; to be responsible for the institution and oversight of work among children and young people, to recommending to the church meeting arrangements for the proper maintenance of buildings and general oversight of all financial responsibilities.

### Who do you see as being called to carry out these functions?

Your current eldership is, as a team, already fulfilling the functions of eldership to a greater or lesser extent. When nominating or electing a person to serve as an elder, you are being asked to consider prayerfully who God is seeking to join them in continuing with this work. When praying you are not seeking to find an individual who is gifted in all the functions of eldership. This is collective work. Some responsibilities are ongoing, others are more dependent on circumstances. Some may be done by small groups, some by everyone.

An elder is no different from any other church member in that we are all called to develop and grow in faith, through prayer, worship, sacraments and learning. The call to eldership is a renewed call to these things as well. So the faith required is the same faith that makes us a Christian. But, at times we all feel lacking in faith, or commitment, or ability. We all feel inadequate in our various callings and service to the church. That is when we need the support and the faith of the rest of the church around us, as well as the grace of God. That is why it is so important to take your time through prayer when considering who to nominate and elect as an elder.

# safeguarding

Safeguarding is taken seriously by the United Reformed Church. Safeguarding is taken seriously by London Street.

As a church, London Street acknowledges children's and adults' right to protection from abuse, regardless of gender, ethnicity, disability, sexuality or beliefs. We consider that the welfare of children is paramount and we have in place a safeguarding policy which follows legislation, statutory guidance and recognised good practice in order to protect vulnerable people in our church.

The aim of this policy is to provide procedures for promoting safeguarding, preventing abuse and protecting children, adults at risk and staff. It includes clear procedures for taking appropriate action when safeguarding concerns are raised involving children and vulnerable adults within our church, or those who attend our activities and events. So who does this policy apply to? Approved and endorsed by the Elders, it applies to everyone who attends London Street. Not just members of our congregation, but to all organisations who hire our building with the agreement to operate under London Street's safeguarding policy.

By reading this article, YOU have a duty of care to all beneficiaries of the church, whether adults or children, as we seek to establish a caring environment in which there is an informed vigilance about the dangers of abuse.

The URC Wessex Synod is running a series of training courses on safeguarding, not just for people within the church who work with vulnerable adults, young people and children; but for all if we are to ensure that everyone promotes safeguarding. There is a training course here at London Street on Saturday, 10<sup>th</sup> September from 10.00am to 4.00pm (registration from 9.30am). The elders are encouraging everyone to attend. ### TWO LITTLE BOYS

A couple had two little boys, ages 8 and 10, who were excessively mischievous. The two were always getting into trouble and their parents could be assured that if any mischief occurred in their town their two young sons were in some way involved.

The parents were at their wits end as to what to do about their sons' behaviour. The mother had heard that a clergyman in town had been successful in disciplining children in the past, so she asked her husband if he thought they should send the boys to speak with the clergyman.

The husband said, 'We might as well. We need to do something before I really lose my temper!' The clergyman agreed to speak with the boys, but asked to see them individually. The 8 year old went to meet with him first. The clergyman sat the boy down and asked him sternly, 'Where is God?'

The boy made no response, so the clergyman repeated the question in an even sterner tone, 'Where is God?' Again the boy made no attempt to answer. So the clergyman raised his voice even more and shook his finger in the boy's face, 'WHERE IS GOD?'

At that the boy bolted from the room and ran directly home, slamming himself in the closet. His older brother followed him into the closet and asked what had happened. The younger brother replied, 'We are in BIG trouble this time. God is missing and they think we did it.'

As the women have to leave the safety of their camps to collect firewood for cooking, it leaves them vulnerable to rape. The wearing of a bra indicates that the woman is higher up the social scale and is more likely to have powerful family and friends who would retaliate for the attack. Therefore, wearing a bra makes them safer. Please bring them to me or leave them in the box in the concourse and I will pass them on. Thanking you in anticipation.
