## View from the manse -

'The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.' Mark I:I

So the season of advent and Christmas is suddenly upon us once more. I'm sure the years get shorter as you get older! It is a



wonderful time of year. Christmas is full of hopefulness and expectation. Sadly though, we adults do get very weighed down with the busyness and extra burdens and demands of this world at this time of year. It is so easy to lose sight of the truly amazing message and wonder of the Christmas story...it just gets somehow lost in the mountain of Christmas wrappings, twinkly lights, tinsel and overabundance of food.

I love the way that children, young children especially, come to the story of Christmas with that wide eyed wonder. That excitement and anticipation that something wonderful *is* just about to happen. And of course they are right to be excited. We are going to hear the stories reread and re-told and remembered of the most astounding event in the history of world. God sending to earth Jesus, his son, to live among ordinary mortals as fully human yet fully divine. Jesus, God with us (which is what Emmanuel means), came as a helpless babe to be for us a glimpse of the Kingdom of God on earth. Before Jesus humans were permanently separated from God. Only priests, on certain feast days, and after extensive ritualised cleansing and sacrificing, could enter the holiest of holies in the temple where the Spirit of God was believed to reside. But even then they could only enter for a short period of time.

Humankind was permanently separated from God by the sin of this world. The birth of Jesus changed this all forever. The new-born Jesus came that we all might one day become born again in his name. By his name we can be adopted forever into the family of God. So really Jesus came as new life in the form of a human baby, and one day he would offer all humans new life in his name. New life in personal relationship with God. He is our pathway to the Kingdom of God! There is no greater story, no greater gift. No amount of twinkling lights, tinsel and feasting could capture the gloriousness, the extravagance of God's gift to us in Jesus! However, for many the Christmas season has lost its glow! For many the talk of joy, hope, love and family, brings into stark focus their own reality of aloneness, of sadness, of lovelessness, and feelings of hopelessness. A family celebrating in joy the delivery of a new baby may just highlight for some that they are not part of a family with whom they can celebrate. They are perhaps not even allowed to shelter in the lowliness of a stable. Their reality may be huddling on the cold stone paving slabs under the shelter of our church porch! For many

Christmas Day is just another day...made somewhat harder by so many things being shut and so many people being too busy to talk to them. This year both London Street and Old Meeting are providing a Christmas Day for those who are alone, lonely or unable to cook their own Christmas dinner (and that includes couples too who would like more company for the day). We will become, for them, their family for that day. They will find with us a traditional Christmas feast, people to chat to, and guizzes to join in, games to play if they wish. There will be music and singing and probably some laughter shared too. So if you want to join us or know of a friend or neighbour who might benefit from lunch and company then speak to Joy Williams at London Street or Mark and Julie Ward at Old Meeting URC in Tadley. The day will be free to the guests, run by local Christians from many churches working together. This is a gift to the community from believers in the Good News of Jesus Christ, God's greatest gift to the world. Jesus came that all, through his name, would be healed from the hurt, pain, injustice and sin of this present in this world. We, as Christians, are the atmosphere changers, bearing the light of hope, the promise of salvation in Jesus' name. It is through us as a community in Christ, that those who have not yet heard the Good News should see a glimmer of the Kingdom of God. And so we pray 'May your kingdom come and your will be done on earth as it is in heaven'.

So may God bless you, and all who are dear to you, with a very happy, healthy, peaceful and joyous Christmas and New Year.



#### FLOWER MINISTRY -

Every Sunday, except during Advent, we have a flower arrangement in the Apse. I wonder if you have ever wondered why? How? Who pays?

The flowers are bought with donations from various people connected with our Church, quite often in memory of a special loved one, a happy memory or just to donate. Would you like to help in this way? Perhaps you could speak to one of the committee listed below.

This flower committee work out each year who will be the donor and who will arrange the flowers. If you opt to give the flowers you can choose the particular colour or flower that you would like to be included; this is particularly done by people remembering their wedding anniversary. Bear in mind that this is subject to availability in the shops but we do try to do as you have requested. If you are able to make your own arrangement we are very happy about that.

After the service the flowers are wrapped into three or four bunches and then taken to people. These include people with celebration, those who are unwell or people whom we feel would benefit with this reminder of the love of the congregation.

I never imagined I would be one of the team but, after Karen had an open day to make a Christmas Wreath and then an Easter arrangement, I discovered I had found a small interest in something artistic. Like many others my first attempt was done alongside an experienced arranger. I think it took me about 2 hours. Now, four or five years later, it is usually about 1-1.5 hours. Personally, I find it enjoyable asking the person I am arranging for which colour or flower they would particularly like to be included. Then off to see the availability of colours in Basingstoke on that weekend. Once in the church we arrange the flowers in a pedestal arrangement to give thanks to God.

Previously we sent flowers to people in hospital but nowadays they are not welcome there. Many people in our membership are housebound and they really welcome a bunch of flowers showing them that they are remembered.

Once the flowers have been wrapped up the artificial arrangement is put back into place for during the week. Some churches leave the flowers in situ for the week, but this seems a pity when they can bring love into the home of 3 or 4 people.

We are very lucky that we do have some very competent arrangers as well as those of us still learning. In the past couple of years we have had the pleasure of making arrangements for weddings. The laughter and friendship between everyone whilst we spend a lot of time making the arrangements is really good.

The first time you come on to the rota the choice of dates can be limited but we do attempt to get as near as possible to a date you prefer.

A few times a year we decorate the window sills and many start with helping there and then come on to do pedestal arrangements – is this something you would like to do?

The flower committee, led by Liz Lindsay, consists of Alison Jamieson, Valerie McKenzie, Julie Bath and me, Joyce Cook.

#### Prayer Shawls

Until recently I had always associated prayer shawls with the Jewish faith. A short time ago Jenny McCloy asked me if I had heard of prayer shawl ministry. Being totally ignorant of prayer shawls with any Christian connections, I came home and turned to Google. I discovered that The Prayer Shawl Ministry was started in America.

In its simplest form, the shawls are made by members of any Christian organisation and then passed on to anyone with a pastoral need. The shawls may be knitted or crocheted, any shape or any colour. The important ingredient is that prayers are said whilst working the shawls, which are then passed on to those who have need of comfort. Experience has shown that they have been beneficial at a time of bereavement, a serious illness or some family crisis. They have also been given to very new mothers who may be feeling a bit lost and out of their depth. The creator of the shawl sometimes writes a prayer to be given anonymously to the recipient of the shawl, just as a personal link from one to the other.

It seemed a very simple and practical way of reaching out to those in need and if anyone at London Street or Tadley would like more information or to join in creating a Prayer Shawl Ministry I would be delighted to hear from them.

# You may have read this tale before but it bears repeating:

Once upon a time, there was an old man who used to go to the ocean to do his writing. He had a habit of walking on the beach every morning before he began his work. Early one morning, he was walking along the shore after a big storm had passed and found the vast beach littered with starfish as far as the eye could see, stretching in both directions.

Off in the distance, the old man noticed a small boy approaching. As the boy walked, he paused every so often and as he grew closer, the man could see that he was occasionally bending down to pick up an object and throw it into the sea. The boy came closer still and the man called out, "Good morning! May I ask what it is that you are doing?"

The young boy paused and looked up. "Throwing starfish into the ocean," he answered, "The tide has washed them up onto the beach and they can't return to the sea by themselves. When the sun gets high, they will die, unless I throw them back into the water."

The old man replied, "But there must be tens of thousands of starfish on this beach. I'm afraid you won't really be able to make much of a difference."

The boy bent down, picked up another starfish and threw it as far as he could into the ocean. Then he turned, smiled and said, "It made a difference to that one!"

An inspirational little story, perhaps one that you've heard before, with a message of encouragement to do what you can, when you can, and not to be daunted by thoughts of how great is the need and how slender are your own resources. "It made a difference to that one."

But how poignant it is today to hear a story of a little boy on a beach who makes a difference. For even as we hold in our mind's eye the heartening mental image of a starfish being thrown back into the sea for safety, it jostles for attention now with another image, a heartbreaking and all-tooreal image alongside it: the news footage of a little child given up by the sea, washed up lifeless on the shore.
