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View from the manse:

For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.' (1 Corinthians 1:18)

I'm writing this 'view from the manse' having just completed an intensive week of coordinating and running the third Tadley Churches Together Holiday Club for children aged between 5 and 11 years. The week went really well. We had fifty-three children attending (full capacity for the week for the first time) and 35 volunteers from across nine churches in the area. At the end of the week we ran a barbecue for the children and their families along with the volunteers who, this year, catered for 125 people (again, the largest one we have organised yet!). Since then I have been reflecting on my role of being the 'fool' for Jesus. Every day during the holiday club I appeared as 'Shiner', a guirky, rather deaf and very old man with a long grey beard that came down to my waist. As Shiner, I came to share the wisdom of my years of studying the Bible as I retold Gospel stories stored within my heart. By the end of the week, having experienced themed games, crafts, activities and a film each day around the Gospel story first told in the morning's short play by the Shiner, the children were able to remember the stories in amazing detail.

So why was I being a fool for Jesus? I wanted to communicate the Gospel in whatever way made it more relevant or memorable to the listeners. If my dressing up as an ancient old man with a ridiculously long beard helps the children to get actively involved in hearing the Gospel message, then I will do it. If making people laugh helps them to remember, then I will make them laugh. If singing the Gospel message helps them remember, then I will sing!

In secular thinking, wisdom comes from knowledge, learning, scholarship and philosophy. One dictionary definition I read said that wisdom is about using personal knowledge, gained by human endeavour, and personal experience to make good decisions and judgements. One wonders who, then, discerns the goodness of those decisions and judgements? Humans often desire recognition for their wisdom as a way of gaining power over others. Wisdom comes from personal knowledge, knowledge over the equal power of others.

In Proverbs 1:7 it says 'The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge; fools despise wisdom and instruction'. From a position of faith, true wisdom is God given. In the Biblical tradition there is no such thing as a self-made man or women. Biblical wisdom is both about one's relationship with God

as well as skill in living in relationship with others. People can be very intellectually intelligent yet emotionally illiterate, others can be emotionally intelligent yet are not at all academic. Christian wisdom is not following a set of rules and commandments, though they are important examples of wisdom, they are not wisdom in themselves. Christ personified the wisdom of God. In Matthew chapter 23 verse 23 Jesus reprimanded the scribes and Pharisees who tied themselves to the detailed letter of the law 'yet neglect the weightier matters of justice, mercy and faithfulness.' We, as Christians, need to have 'listening hearts, which, in Hebrew, is the discernment that Solomon (Solomon whom many regarded as wise) seeks from God. Listening hearts we need to tune into God through prayer, through studying scripture and through maturing in our faith 'to the measure of the full stature of Christ'. Ephesians 4:13.

Jesus came as God's rescue plan for human kind. Humans cannot achieve salvation through their own endeavours, through their own understanding or human wisdom. It is through Christ alone that we come into full relationship with God. Jesus is the key to the kingdom of God that our hearts yearn for. Yet Jesus died alone on the cross. He was humiliated. stripped, beaten, mocked, nailed to a cross before the greatest human might and wisdom of his day, that is, the Roman authorities, the Scribes and Pharisees. He was willing to be made a fool of in order that we might achieve forgiveness of our sins through Him. He has paid the price for our selfishness and sin. But to those outside of the Christian faith. Jesus dving on the cross will be seen as an act of foolishness. Indeed Billy Graham comments that those outside of faith see the cross as 'offensive'. We must put aside the desire for self and humble ourselves before the cross of Christ. Sometimes the wisdom of our faith may be called into question. We may even be mocked for our foolishness in believing. But our believing is not about human understanding; there will always be an element of mystery to what we can understand of God. But by putting aside the power we gain through human intellectual endeavour and faithfully becoming a fool for Jesus we may actually become a little wiser in the eyes of God.

As we come into the response phase of the 'Who Cares?' mission this is my prayer for us all...

Loving Lord Jesus, give us listening hearts we pray. Give us listening hearts that we may respond wisely to the needs and hurts that have been revealed to us in this community through the 'Who Cares?' listening phase. By the power of your Holy Spirit, may we unite as your body in this place in order to be your hands, your feet, your ears, your eyes, your mouth, your heart to those that we meet. May we always speak your love through actions and words to those who are in need.

Prayer Focus

St Paul wrote in Romans 1 v 16 "For I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God that brings salvation to everyone who believes: first to the Jew and then to the Gentile."

Unlike Paul I have to admit that sometimes I experience a "cringe factor" when the Gospel of Christ is proclaimed in certain ways. Why is that? Is it them or me? Do I feel embarrassed by some Christian truth because it is in contrast with conventional ideas and I want the Gospel to be acceptable to the hearers? It is all very well to want to be relevant and acceptable but in reducing any part of the uniqueness of the Gospel we do not strengthen it, but weaken it. If we bring Christianity to the lowest common denominator with the world we end up with Christ as the one who serves our needs. fulfils our aspirations, and endorses our values. This makes us feel good but it isn't transforming, it merely affirms most of what we already hold dear. It doesn't address the root of our alienation from God, and the corruptness of the human heart. It doesn't address the wrath of God that was fully satisfied in the cross of Christ, and it doesn't bring us into union with Christ. We simply coast along with no expectation of the work of God in our lives. The Gospel is confrontational because it is transformational. The two go together. We short change the people we long to reach with the Good News if we relay only the parts we think are palatable. People need to know they are sinners and this condition keeps them alienated from God

There are only two ways we can go in this life. We are either in a state of perishing, which if not rectified through the cross of Christ, will result in eternal separation from God or we can acknowledge that we need saving and that in coming humbly to the cross of Christ we have a Saviour who not only indwells us with His Spirit, but saves us to eternal life.

The Gospel is costly, because it involves submitting our lives to Christ, and living His way for His agenda. He becomes Lord, sovereign in our lives and in exchange, we receive His life, and the unlimited resources made available in Him. That is the adventure of the Christian life, and the Gospel everyone needs to hear.

Prayer: Dear Lord, in my witness for You, help me not to be concerned about the cringe factor, but to reveal to others what You would have me say. Thank You, Lord.

Art exhibition:

Co-ordinated by a group of artists who have participated in a course at St. Mary's Church, Old Basing, the art works will be connected to Biblical themes and be displayed in the Concourse and the Sanctuary from 15th to 28th September 2017, during Café opening hours. All London Street members are invited to a private view, including talks by some of the artists, on 15th September (see p.13).

At the July church meeting, Kay reported on the very successful pilot scheme which ran over the winter of 2016/17. Owen has a copy of the Pilot Project Report referred to by Kay at the meeting should anyone wish to read it.

ELECTION OF ELDERS -

We shall shortly be considering the nomination and election of members to be called to serve as elders. Being an elder is a ministry to which a church member is called by God. This call can come through you as a church member when considering another for nomination and election because of what you discern about that person.

Procedure for nomination and election as provided for by the constitution of London Street

Church meeting shall determine the maximum number of elders whose election is sought. A list of those eligible to serve as elders shall be handed to those on the current church roll. Each member will be entitled to nominate up to two more church members than the maximum to be elected. All those nominated by at least 4% of church members shall be considered validly nominated. They will be visited to ascertain whether they are willing to accept nomination.

All of those who have accepted nomination shall be listed on a ballot paper, which will be made available to all on the current church roll, for election to serve as an elder for a term of 3 years. The ballot shall normally take place at the November church meeting.

What does it mean to be an elder at London Street and within the United Reformed Church?

Being an elder means that a church member has been called to be part of a 'team', since an elder is someone who joins with others to form the Elders' meeting of London Street. It is important though to remember that in accepting a call to serve as an elder, that person is not just an elder of London Street but an elder of the United Reformed Church. A person can only be nominated for eldership if they are on the church roll of members for a minimum of 12 months. As a church member, they will have an understanding of the constitutions of the United Reformed Church and that of London Street.

What does an elder do?

The functions of eldership in the United Reformed Church have been laid down in the Basis of Union. The list appears daunting. They include:

ensuring that public worship is regularly offered and the sacraments are duly administered, to ensuring pastoral care for the congregation;

to be responsible for the institution and oversight of work among children and young people, to recommending to the church meeting arrangements for the proper maintenance of buildings and general oversight of all financial responsibilities.

Who do you see as being called to carry out these functions?

Your current eldership is, as a team, already fulfilling the functions of eldership to a greater or lesser extent. When nominating or electing a person to serve as an elder, you are being asked to consider prayerfully who God is seeking to join them in continuing with this work. When praying you are not seeking to find an individual who is gifted in all the functions of eldership. This is collective work. Some responsibilities are ongoing, others are more dependent on circumstances. Some may be done by small groups, some by everyone.

An elder is no different from any other church member in that we are all called to develop and grow in faith, through prayer, worship, sacraments and learning. The call to eldership is a renewed call to these things as well. So the faith required is the same faith that makes us Christian. But, at times we all feel lacking in faith, or commitment, or ability. We all feel inadequate in our various callings and service to the church. That is when we need the support and the faith of the rest of the church around us, as well as the grace of God. That is why it is so important to take your time through prayer when considering who to nominate and elect as an elder.

'Becoming an Eco Church'

Looking after our environment continues to be a high profile topic in our world today and, as Christians charged with the Biblical responsibility to look after God's creation, it is something we should take seriously. Many of the mainstream churches are looking to address this through the 'Eco Church' movement. The following is an article written by Jean Wilde, who heads up the 'Eco Church' at Christ Church, Chineham, in which she outlines the history, aims and progress of the project there.

Article.....

At Christ Church Chineham we took the decision to take part in the eco project supported by the diocese of Winchester and announced by Justin Welby in January 2016. It was not a difficult decision as we had in the past received a diocesan environmental award at bronze level and our assistant minister, Gordon Randall, is Stewardship Adviser for the diocese. The church council subsequently decided to include working on green issues within the community as part of the Parish Mission Action Plan and we were presented with the bronze award by the Bishop of Basingstoke at Easter.

The project is organised by A Rocha UK in partnership with the Church of England, Christian Aid, Tearfund and the Methodist Church. It is a Christian charity working for the protection and restoration of the natural world. Their Churches and Theology Director, Dr Ruth Valerio, has written several books on the topic and was a guest last November when Christ Church hosted an evening entitled 'Tools for Transformation'.

The project is an ecumenical one and there has been a joint working group set up on climate change and theology convened by the Baptist Union of Great Britain, the Methodist Church and the United Reformed Church. The Methodist Church is building on its existing Eco-Congregation Award scheme which encompasses spiritual, practical and communal activities to set up its Eco Circuit Award which links in with Christian environmental movements including A Rocha.

The United Reformed Church produced its statement of intent in its Environmental Policy for the United Reformed Church 2016 affirming as a church the need for caring for creation, the just sharing of the world's resources and concern for the environment. This document is well worth reading as it also sets out the Biblical basis for taking on such responsibilities.

The eco award covers five distinct areas and you will see that at London Street you are already doing things which would count, such as Christian


Aid, Fairtrade and I believe some people went on the climate change march. These are the categories: Worship and Teaching, Buildings, Land, Community and Global Engagement and finally Lifestyle. We began by naming me as the contact 'eco champ' as I had been involved in Greening Chineham as part of Basingstoke Green Week. Some churches have set up a small green team. We held a few swap shopping events, set up a designated notice board and began putting items in the church magazine. We are already known in the local community as a recycling centre.

It is as time consuming and arduous as you want it to be and I have met many new people within the church and the wider community. If you are thinking of getting involved and want more information please contact me on jeanmartyn123@btinternet.com. At the end of the day, however, it is not really about winning awards is it? – we are doing what God has called us to do.
