### THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

This month Peter Bentall discusses forgiveness and its place in our collective conscience.

Many politicians these days seem to be banging on about upholding traditional 'British values' against a sea of 'woke' and urging everyone to 'do the right thing', whatever that means!



Most of us would almost certainly take that to mean having the basic Christian teachings of Jesus (shared by many other faiths), expounded in the Gospels. One fundamental tenet is 'forgiveness' - Jesus came to earth to die for our sins and thereby enabled us to obtain God's forgiveness and open our way into His kingdom through the sacrifice He made (which is what our journey through Lent is all about).

So, a 15-year-old girl, Shamima Begum, ten years ago, somehow (independently?) reaches the conclusion that she and two friends should travel to join Islamic State in order to help bring about a revolution, by whatever violent and barbaric means necessary. The girls' role, to be forced wives/mothers/slaves, if not active participants.

She is married, has three children who all die, her friends are killed, IS is defeated, and she has to spend years in a remote Kurdish detention camp. Our government strips her of her citizenship, thus leaving her stateless, and she has just lost an appeal to have it restored.

Many of us will have had 15-year-old children and even grandchildren, what if any of them, making a very serious mistake in their lives at 15, was branded for life and simply cast aside, helpless and hopeless!?

Does not Jesus' 'Parable of the Prodigal...' (Luke 15: 11-31) apply exactly to this situation? Is not unconditional forgiveness one of those core 'British values' they go on about based on that teaching? Certainly, our government doesn't seem to think so. Do we?



### Retiring Collections to support Commitment for Life and Basingstoke Town Chaplaincy

Before Covid, the congregation was provided with an opportunity once a month to support 'Commitment for Life' and a local charity. The opportunity was a retiring collection which we would have after our communion service.

### What is Commitment for Life?

Commitment for Life is the URC's global justice programme. It encourages each local congregation, to make global justice a core foundation of its mission. They support the local congregations by offering resources to facilitate prayer, advocacy, and effective action for the most vulnerable people in the world. Commitment for Life works through recognised charities, particularly Christian Aid and Global Justice.

### Is London Street a member?

Yes. There are three regions that a local congregation can support. We support, through Christian Aid, all three: Bangladesh; Israel and the occupied Palestinian territory; and Zimbabwe. Each church appoints a Commitment for Life link person. Through that link person, each church receives regular mailings throughout the year. This will include news about your region, posters and leaflets, opportunities to give, worship resources, latest information on campaigns, and ideas for prayer, services, and action. Our link person is currently Alison Jamieson.

### Giving

There are several ways that churches can support people through Commitment for Life. In addition to prayer, financial contributions play a crucial role in supporting the most vulnerable people in the regions mentioned. At London Street we have envelopes labelled 'Commitment for Life' that you can use and place them in the offertory plate on any Sunday or you can make a retiring donation on a communion Sunday. If the latter, Gift Aid is added by the church. Gift Aid through an individual's envelope is added if you have granted permission for the church to claim Gift Aid on your donation. It is this 'Giving' that we would like to recommence. Of the donations provided, 75% is to support Christian Aid partners in the three regions, 5% goes to Global Justice Now to support its work against poverty, and 20% is

retained to cover education, grants, administration, and advocacy. The Wessex Synod matches the contributions to Commitment for Life made by churches in the synod.

### **Local Charity**

The local charity we have supported previously through our retiring collection has been the Town Chaplaincy. Basingstoke Town Chaplaincy has a team of trained chaplains to provide support to people in the workplace. They are not paid by the employer, and anything discussed will remain confidential. Chaplains have been designated to visit places on a regular basis within the town centre and they have been selected and trained to be good listeners and are available to talk with colleagues and customers alike. Examples of the places they visit include: the shops, cafes and offices in the town centre, the Magistrates Court, and the bus station. They are careful not to interrupt work, but for longer conversations it can easily be arranged for an individual to speak to a Chaplain privately. The Town Chaplaincy team is there for everyone, whether an individual has faith in God or no faith at all. All the Chaplains are committed Christians, they are there to support everyone, to listen to whatever a person may want to talk about and to respond with the love of God.

### **February Church Meeting**

Following a discussion at our last Church Meeting, it was overwhelmingly carried that Communion Offerings be collected monthly in support of Commitment for Life and the Town Centre Chaplaincy. It will be the responsibility of the 2nd Elder on duty to arrange for two collectors, one at each end of the church. The collections will commence after the Communion Service on 3rd March and on every Communion Sunday thereafter.

### **Collectors**

If you would like to help on a Communion Sunday after each service, please let me know and I will provide the Elders with a list of helpers.

### **COMMUNITY COOKBOOK**

This month we have three recipes from the URC recipe booklet 'Walking towards Easter together'.

### **EASTER BISCUITS**

### **INGREDIENTS:**

100g unsalted butter
75g caster sugar
1 egg, separated
Grated zest of a lemon
200g plain flour
50g currants
1 to 2 tbsp milk

### **METHOD:**

- 1. Preheat oven to 200°C. Beat sugar and butter until light and fluffy. Add egg yolk and lemon zest, sift in the flour and mix well. Stir in the currants and then add just enough milk so that you can form into a ball of soft dough.
- 2. Knead the dough on a floured surface for a few minutes. Then roll it out until it is 5mm thick. Using a 6cm cutter cut into 24 rounds. Place into a baking tray lined with baking paper and bake in the oven for 8 minutes. Meanwhile beat the egg white, using a fork.
- 3. Take the partly baked biscuits out of the oven and brush the tops with egg white, sprinkle with caster sugar then return to the oven for a further 5 minutes.
- 4. Leave to cool on the tray for a few minutes before putting on a wide cooling rack.

### SHREDDED WHEAT CROWN OF THORNS

### **INGREDIENTS:**

Shredded Wheat

Milk chocolate, melted



### **METHOD:**

- 1. Crumble shredded wheat, try to keep it in as long strands as possible.
- 2. Mix in the melted chocolate, making sure all strands are coated.
- 3. On a piece of baking parchment, arrangements an upside down ramekin dish to create a crown of thorns, leave to set.



### **HOT CROSS BUNS**



### **INGREDIENTS:**

500g strong white flour, plus extra for dusting

75g caster sugar

2 tsp mixed spice powder

1 tsp ground cinnamon

1 lemon, finely grated zest only

10g salt

10g fast-action dried yeast

40g butter

300ml milk

1 egg, beaten

200g sultanas

50g finely chopped mixed candied peel

Oil, for greasing

(For the topping)

75g plain flour

2 tbsp golden syrup or apricot jam, for glazing

### **METHOD:**

- 1. Mix the flour, sugar, spices, and lemon zest together in a large bowl. Then add the salt and yeast, placing them on opposite sides of the bowl.
- 2. Melt the butter, either in a pan or in the microwave. Similarly warm the milk in a separate pan until it is lukewarm. Add the butter and half

the tepid milk to the dry ingredients. Stir in the butter, milk and the egg, first with a spoon and then with your hands, drawing the dry ingredients in from the side of the bowl. As you begin to draw the mixture together, gradually add more warm milk (you may well not need all of it) until the mixture holds together as a sticky but pliable dough. Add the dried fruit and candied peel and knead them into the ball of dough until they are incorporated into it.

- 3. Lightly flour a solid work surface and tip your ball of dough out onto it. Lightly knead by hand for about ten minutes, until it forms a smooth ball which bounces back when pressed, and looks smooth. This stage can also be done in a food processor using a dough hook if you prefer.
- 4. Place the dough in a bowl which has been coated with a layer of vegetable oil, cover with cling film, and leave to rest in a warm place for an hour to an hour and a half, until it is about twice the original size.
- 5. Put the ball of dough on to a floured surface and divide into twelve balls. Line one to two baking trays with paper, and place the balls on the tray, placing them fairly close together and flattening them slightly.
- 6. Cover, but don't wrap, the baking trays in oiled cling film or with a clean tea towel. Leave for another hour, until the buns have doubled in size.
- 7. Preheat the oven to 220°C/200°C fan/gas mark 7.
- 8. To make the cross on top of the buns, mix the flour together with 100ml water to make a paste and spoon it into an icing bag. If you add the water slowly, you can judge the thickness of the paste.
- 9. When the buns have risen, pipe a cross on each bun. Bake for 15-20 minutes until pale golden-brown.
- 10. Melt the golden syrup or apricot jam in a pan. Use this to brush over the warm buns to create a glaze, before putting them on a cooling rack to cool.
