THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

This month Jenny McCloy discusses change, good and bad, and something that never changes.



Over recent weeks, we have celebrated with two of our members who have reached the fantastic age of 90!

This started me thinking—what changes have happened over the lifetimes of Christine and Shirley?

Over the last 90 years significant societal, technological and economic shifts have reshaped the world.

Key changes include advancements in healthcare leading to increased life expectancy; major technological leaps, like the rise of the internet and mobile phones, and transformation in social structures, such as changing family dynamics and the decline of religious attachment. Additionally, economic shifts include increased global connectiveness and the rise of new industries, alongside ongoing challenges related to poverty, inequality, and loneliness.

Just take a moment to step back and think about what changes have taken place in your life experiences over recent years. What do your children/grandchildren take for granted/accept as the norm which were unheard of in your early life or your parents' lives. These may include labour saving devices around the home e.g. did your parents have a freezer? This is something we mostly now take for granted. Think of how your house was heated—did you have central heating, or did you rely on a single coal fire in the living room? What about lighting your home? Ian can remember having gas mantle lights which were eventually replaced when electricity was installed in the house when he was 7 years old! Now we can have our lighting, and many other things, linked to a timer so they will come on at a set time. Change can also come to your garden, from having a push along lawnmower to being able to watch from the comfort of your sofa while a robotic mower will cut your grass!

In technology, we have seen an explosion in computing and communication. The invention of the internet, mobile phones, and A.I. have revolutionised how people live, work, and interact.

Many of the changes over the last 90 years have seen a growing awareness of and concern about environmental issues, including climate change and pollution. This awareness has prompted calls for sustainable development.

Another huge change which we have seen has been in transport and how we travel from place to place—it is even possible to fly direct to Perth from London in about 17 hours!

But... is all this change necessarily good? Obviously, we saw at the beginning of these thoughts that there have been massive changes for the good. But is all change good or are there downsides to it? How does change affect us? Change, whether expected or unexpected can impact various aspects of our lives. It influences our emotions, our mental health and our personal development. While it can for some people bring stress and anxiety, change also represents opportunities for growth and learning. The way that life has changed can present many challenges, one aspect which comes to my mind is the explosion of the internet and what is available online. Whilst this can be wonderful—you can find out anything by going to a search engine (no need for an Encyclopaedia Britannica these days, sadly!). But this has a huge downside when we think of what is available for young people to access online—very often material which is unsuitable or even dangerous. How difficult it is for parents to monitor what their child can access through their mobile phone. Bullying too has increased as it can be constant. At one time once you left the school building the bullying stopped... not anymore!

But what does the Bible say about change?

Throughout the Bible we have the confirmation that God stays the same.

The Bible states that God is unchanging. One famous verse from Malachai, 3:6 declares: *'I, the Lord, do not change'*.

And Hebrews 13:8 emphasises Jesus Christ's unchanging nature: 'Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever'.

And James 1:17 'Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above coming down from the Father of lights with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change'.

The unchanging nature of God offers profound comfort in a world of constant change. Knowing that God's promises and love remain consistent provides stability and security amidst life's uncertainties.

God's true nature, of being loving and merciful, doesn't change—ever!!


Congratulations to Ethan Grant who began his four year apprenticeship with a local company in July. He will also attend BCOT one day a week to work towards his level 3 qualification.


