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# New Year Certainty

Put simply, January 1<sup>st</sup> is just the day after December 31<sup>st</sup>, but for most people it has far more significance than that. A New Year engenders many different emotions, looking back on a previous 12 months which we may be glad to get rid of, or looking forward with hope or trepidation, or expectation or gloom. For those of us with birthdays in January the thought that we have lived another year already.

At the beginning of 2020, personally, we had the immediate expectation of a joint 80<sup>th</sup> birthday celebration with all our immediate family one evening for a meal in London - a truly memorable family occasion to be treasured. But, after that, suddenly the country was in lockdown and the rest, as they say, is history. Since then we have lived with, what at times have seemed confusing restrictions of one sort or another. Some have been legal, some regulatory, some guidelines, some advisory, some personal choice, and that continues. The one word that has become an enduring reality in all this is 'uncertainty'. In the period between my writing this and it appearing in Focus we may even have had another Christmas lockdown. All is uncertain.

And this is where our Christian message is so important for everyone to hear. With God all is not uncertain. For Christians the word 'hope' is used multiple times through both Old and New Testaments, and that hope is for us a certainty. 'In the sure and certain hope in our resurrection to eternal life' is what following Jesus is all about.

The writer of Hebrews states that absolute certainty 'Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, and today, and forever' (Heb 13v8) and Jesus himself said 'surely I will never leave you or forsake you. I will be with you always to the very end of the age' (Mat 28v20).

# Climate Change Catch Up

### **Batteries**

Any major retail outlet or supermarket that sells more than 32kg of new batteries every year must take back used batteries under the Battery Directive.

Any portable waste batteries ranging from Coin Cell to D-cell batteries can be taken to high street retail outlets including but not limited to Currys, Robert Dyas, Argos, Poundland, WH Smith etc, all of which have used batteries tubes within their stores.

All major supermarkets also have used battery tubes, normally located within prominent positions within their stores (normally somewhere around the main entrance).

### Coffee pods

Different brands offer different take back schemes for used pods. For example Nespresso have over 5000 drop off points or customers can arrange a collection. <u>Find out more information on</u> <u>Nespresso recycling.</u> Search your preferred brand online for the best way to recycle your pods.

## Alternative ways of recycling

Alternatively, you can recycle them via community networks similar to eBay, which do not involve money. Two such networks are <u>Freecycle</u> and <u>Basingstoke Freegle</u>.

Since July we have at London Street been purchasing eco-friendly cleaning products from Triple O Packaging that are not only kinder to the environment but we are able to refill our existing containers each time we reorder.

Olumide is a member at Christ Church Chineham and helps with the community food hub and I learnt of his company, Triple O Packaging, through Penny.

Triple O Packaging is a new refill business located here in Basingstoke and refill sustainable household products for customers, helping them eliminate single-use packaging waste. And Olumide delivers his products in an electric vehicle to further minimise the environmental impact.

Olumide founded his company in 2020 with a vision and passion to realise a world where packaging is too valuable to be wasted. To encourage us all to rethink our relationship with packaging and move towards circular and reusable systems that reduce single use packaging waste, I invited Olumide to draft an article for Focus.

### JUST A "LITTLE" STEP – AN ARTICLE BY OLUMIDE OJU-ORATOKHAI

It is no longer news that we are in trouble on many fronts regarding how we have managed the natural resources and environment of our planet thus far. The Netflix documentary - Breaking Boundaries by Sir David Attenborough, based on the works of Johan Rockstrom and other scientists, explained that there are some critical systems and their associated boundaries within which humans can live and sustainably survive on our planet. These include biodiversity loss, climate change, freshwater consumption, ocean acidification, ozone depletion, aerosol/particulate pollutants, novel/unknown chemical pollutions (toxins, plastics, heavy metals, endocrine disruptors), land use (deforestation) and bio-geochemical (atmospheric Nitrogen loss and Phosphorus flows into oceans)<sup>1</sup>.

The studies make the simple point that once certain tipping points are reached for these systems, their negative consequences may become irreversible leading to irrecoverable damages that cannot sustain life on the planet as we know it today. It was reported that we're already in risky territory on climate change, biodiversity, land use and nitro-phosphorus cycles and that what we do in this decade ending 2030 will be crucial to our long-term survival on the planet.

Whilst I'm no doomsday preacher, and even if the science may sound complicated and contains some unknowns, age-old easily understandable concepts like conservation of resources come to similar simple conclusions that if you use up anything more than your/its ability to regenerate it/itself, you will simply run out. This applies to many things from the money in your bank account, the crude oil in the ground and the fish in the ocean. Likewise, if pollutants (be it aerosols, microplastics, heavy metals or toxins) accumulate in the body or environment beyond what our biological mechanisms can cope with or filter out, things begin to go awry. One of our unsustainable ways is the buy-use-dispose lifestyle we've all become used to with supermarketing. It is wasteful and leads to unmanageable waste/litter ending up in wildlife and affecting their lifespan, productivity and eventually threatening biodiversity and our own food supply.

This nicely brings me to the point on what we (as "little" individuals) can do in the face of such massive problems. The good thing is that individuals have something that businesses want. Businesses always follow the latest consumer trend to satisfy what consumers want or need. More crudely, businesses want a bit of your money and they will do what you want to get it. Although not everyone can be an Attenborough, Johan or Gretha and create big awareness campaigns, you can contribute an equally effective voice by voting with your purse. Once you start to make simple adjustments and buy into more sustainable, low impact, less wasteful products and services, you are effectively creating a trend that businesses will want to invest in and satisfy, especially when you tell your friends and family to do the same. You could start with things like buying local produce, buying in-season loose fruits and vegetables as much as possible, and refilling to minimise packaging waste. Such little changes become big trends when more and more of us buy into them.

These are simple choices that only require a small shift in shopping style. You can start with refill services like Top Up (here in Basingstoke) where your own existing containers can be refilled with sustainable (ethical consumer

recommended<sup>2</sup>) cleaning, body-care and laundry products. They set up pop up stands at Christ Church in Chineham on Wednesdays and at Basingstoke Garden Centre in Dummer on Saturdays. They can also come to refill at your door with their zero-emissions mobile factory if you live within Basingstoke. Check them out at <u>www.top-topup.co.uk</u>.

Although the uptake for reusable consumer packaging is currently below 3%, the case for refill is valid because a 20-time reuse of a packaging produces only 5% of the waste and environmental impact from using the same packaging only once<sup>3</sup>. Imagine the scale of waste reduction that can be achieved if more of us choose to top up only a few products per year instead of continuing to use the packaging once and disposing. These benefits of reuse also outweigh those of just recycling.

On a positive note, it's been encouraging to see London Street URC take their starting steps towards refills with their first top up in Plastic-Free. Top Up estimates that every time you refill a similar order like the one placed in July, you will be preventing the wastage of about 5 bottles weighing a combined 720g, thus avoiding the associated 2.4kg of CO2 equivalents, which is similar to the emissions from travelling 8 miles in an average petrol car.

With more people and organisations refilling and topping up instead of creating single-use packaging waste from every purchase, we can hopefully send the message to big business/big supermarket about how we now prefer to shop. And believe me, they will follow your money and make refill become larger scale, more accessible, more economical, more efficient and more impactful, thus reversing the dangers we face on one of the pollution boundaries of our planet. Consequently, we and future generations can enjoy this God-given, life-supporting planet till Thy Kingdom Come!

# Missionary Work in Africa:

Seb, who is a continuing member of the URC at Tadley/Basingstoke, joined AIM in 2010 as a short termer and in 2011 as a full termer and currently works with them as their mobilisation and church partnership coordinator, based in Kampala, Uganda but travelling and connecting with churches in South Sudan, DRC, Rwanda, Chad and more recently Burundi. Seb is fully committed to his work in Africa with AIM travelling 'home' to the UK only every couple of years. If you want to find out more about Seb's work in Africa or how you can help support Seb in his work please let us know.

Seb writes from Uganda with an update and his prayer points:

"I become more and more convinced that we will see a movement of missionaries from the universities in this country, and so in looking at mobilisation and the sending of Global professionals from Uganda to the Arab world there are countless opportunities for discipleship, speaking in services, small group discussions and connecting people for ministry with unreached people groups here in the city. God in his sovereignty has brought people to this city from some of the world's hardest to reach places, and it's a joy to see several churches and university chapels respond to this. Global mission doesn't always mean leaving home – we are seeing a growing burden in the lives of several students as they play football and seek to build relationships with our friends from other faiths.

"St Francis Church, which I attend, graciously gave me office space to use, based at Makerere University near the town centre, and as I write this I'm on a bus heading to the East to meet a university there and explore more how we can partner together. I am thankful for many partnerships with universities, churches and organisations – often I've asked 'what is my place, and what is AIM's place at the table in mobilisation here?' Churches and indigenous mission organisations are growing and so what is our place? Several people and the Lord have made it clear that our place is in making connections – creating partnerships nationally and globally, networking and through this helping to build capacity in these churches and organisations for global mission.

"It truly is a great privilege to connect with so many people weekly as well as walking with several students and church leaders.

"Please pray:

• For continued good connections and networks to be established to help facilitate a movement of missionaries from Uganda to the world,

- For the refugees in this country from some of the world's most unreached places please pray they will hear and respond to the gospel,
- For the Lord to continue what he is doing in our universities, we are believing for a movement of people taking their profession to make disciples in Uganda and across the world."

Thank you so much for your support for Seb. Do continue to pray for Seb as he couldn't be serving with AIM without your support, so thank you for the part you are playing in this important ministry through your gifts and prayers.

May God bless you richly in your partnership with him in the Gospel.
