A Thought for the Month

Really? A thought for the month simply isn't enough!

Politicians tell church leaders to keep out of politics, yet their decisions affect everyday life for us all. Without wishing to make this a political article, my understanding of Christ's challenge to those of us who are fortunate enough to be able to look after ourselves, is simply to do our best to support and care for those who can't, as far as we are able.

We have a situation at the moment in our country, where millions of people are having to choose between eating or keeping warm. The Joseph Rowantree figures state that 31% of our nation's children are living in poverty. Elderly people are suffering too. We face a forecast of a massive increase in the cost of living this Autumn and Winter, which will only exacerbate the situation. Charitable organisations, which are already struggling to help the poor, say the situation can only get worse.

This leaves all those of us with a Christian conscience to try to do what we can to alleviate these hardships, wherever and however we can. Individually our efforts may seem trivial, but collectively these contributions can be enormous. As examples of helping, we can purchase extra household items to donate to a local Foodbank or help on our church's Food Table to give food to desperate people.

Whilst all of those in need should be in our prayers, it is also vitally important that we remain vigilant and aware of the struggles around us....friends, neighbours', even family members' needs may go unnoticed ----it is important that we remain lovingly observant, so that we can try to address a need should it arise.

Although the struggles mentioned earlier are endemic in the UK, we should not miss the massive hardships experienced around the world. During our worship at the beginning of Christian Aid Week, led by Laura Mead, we heard how Christian Aid works with some of the world's most vulnerable communities in 29 countries, in every corner of the globe. They help during emergencies, but their main work is in encouraging local people to work towards a better future for themselves; for example, in Africa Christian Aid works towards peacebuilding in South Sudan, promoting resilient farming in Kenya

and challenging inequality in Sierra Leone and, with women, to increase their access to sustainable energy in Burkina Faso, Ethiopia and Malawi.

Maybe one of the plights I have briefly mentioned above will catch your imagination and encourage you to help in some small way---(remember how powerful prayer can be too), but always remember the passage Alison read in church on May 15th as we concentrated on Christian Aid Week: (John 13: 31-35) Verses 34/35 say, 'I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you should also love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another' and also remember a hymn we sang that day reminding us of our Christian responsibility:

'Brother Sister, let me serve you, Let me be as Christ to you'

The carers give each other support as they understand the demands of 24/7 care for a loved one.

Sadly, we have lost 3 of our members recently, one of whom was Roger Pike, who had been a part of Memory Tree since its beginning. He has been greatly missed by everyone.

The atmosphere in Memory Tree is a very happy, light-hearted one. We try to provide an environment in which everyone feels welcome and valued. There is the opportunity to play games like Rummikub, Scrabble or draughts, do jigsaws or just to sit and enjoy conversation. All this is whilst enjoying a drink and home made cakes. Memory Tree gives carers some much needed space.

We also enjoy outings, from trips on the Watercress Line, to a morning's drive in the countryside, followed by lunch at a garden centre. We were also delighted that some of our guests came to the URC's Big Day Out recently.

We are planning a Jubilee Party in June when, hopefully, some of the guests will bring memorabilia from the Queen's long reign, and we will decorate the Hook Room with bunting and balloons.

We have a great team of volunteers who prepare refreshments, play games with the guests or are around to chat or to listen. We have been especially grateful recently to 'the two Beverleys' (Cantwell and Harris), who have taken on the very important work in the kitchen. Since changes to the Oasis Cafe we have been responsible for providing all our own refreshments and clearing away. It is physically demanding and it was becoming increasingly hard for those of the volunteers who are not getting any younger. Therefore we really appreciate the work of the two most recent additions to our team. We also appreciate Doina's contribution, she often works through a great deal of pain, but surprises us all with her knowledge of everyone's drink and cake preferences!
